






Birding Trail Creates Regional Attraction

he coastal wetlands along Lake Huron's Saginaw Bay are not universally appreciated, even by locals, says Zachary Branigan, Saginaw Basin Land Conservancy's executive director. Not everyone understands the critical role wetlands play for a cleaner lake by acting as a natural filter, or that they offer opportunities for recreational uses, such as kayaking and birding.

Wings Over Western Waters

In 2011, Executive Director Andrew Mackie and Executive Director Marie McCarty of the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust, Homer, Alaska, started discussing how they could work together across the West to further local and national bird conservation goals. Drawing from his background in bird conservation, Andrew recognized the opportunity to partner with other land trusts and bird conservation organizations to make a meaningful difference in land conservation. From this initial conversation, Wings Over Western Waters was born.

With support of the Intermountain West and the Pacific Coast Joint Ventures we have been working with land trusts of the Snake River in the West. The initial focus of this program is on two critical habitat types in the West: riparian and wetlands. These water dependent habitats are important for a variety reasons. Each comprises only a small percentage of the overall Specific objective Western landscape, but provides significant benefits for agriculture, fisheries, wildlife, water quality, and outdoor areas via perpetua recreation. The Land Trust of the Upper Arkansas is focused on all of these benefits so incorporating bird conservathat support high tion goals into the existing land conservation strategy will only help bring more resources to the effort. Wings Over Western Waters will also let the Land Trusts contribute to a larger conservation effort with significance across the

West by providing migratory bird habitat for species identified as declining.

58% of land trusts agreed

that lack of staff/volunteers to monitor their land <u>limited</u> their ability to accomplish bird and habitat conservation

79% of land trusts agreed that they would increase their bird and habitat conservation with availability of volunteers to inventory or monitor birds

76% of land trusts agreed

that they would <u>increase</u> their bird and habitat conservation with availability of a <u>tool to allow staff or volunteers to</u> <u>inventory or monitor birds</u>






Species Distribution Maps






April, Last 10 Years, Full Range









Northern Pintail October







